Course Description:

Students will explore the impact of philosophy on educational thought, practices and ethics from Plato and Aristotle to the present. Emphasis will be placed on an ethical exploration of educational practices and policy. Students will be encouraged to explore and rethink their own educational philosophies.

For the current semester, EDU 509 has been developed as a hybrid course. To this end, we will hold class on the following Tuesday evenings: 8/26, 9/9, 9/23, 9/30, 10/28, 11/4, 11/25 and 12/2. Other scheduled evenings will incorporate eCollege as a platform for online discussions of assigned readings.

Course Outcomes:

- 1. The ability to identify, define, and debate the merits of the substantive philosophies of educational theory and practice.
- 2. An understanding of how educational philosophy guides practice.
- 3. The ability to clearly articulate a personal educational philosophy, present the philosophy to a group of peers, and answer questions about/defend the philosophy.
- 4. The ability to examine current and past school methods, practices, and pedagogies and determine how methods, practices, and pedagogies change as educational philosophies evolve.
- 5. The ability to analyze the reasons for, and results of, philosophical conflicts between various stakeholders in the educational process.

Course Requirements:

- 1. Actively and intelligently engage in in-class and online discussions.
- 2. Work cooperatively with teammates to develop and facilitate an online discussion of a philosophical "school of thought".
- 3. Develop a written personal philosophy of education, share your philosophy with your classmates, and answer a number of questions regarding your beliefs.
- 4. Assume the persona of a philosopher of your choice and be able to articulate your understanding of what the philosophical position(s) your philosopher would likely hold concerning a number of current educational issues.
- 5. Write a paper (final exam) that is grounded in our philosophical explorations in which you articulate how your education philosophy has changed as a result of our readings and discussions and be prepared to informally share your conclusions with your classmates.
- 6. Attend all classes, arriving on time and staying for the duration of class.

NOTE: For any assignments that include documentation of sources, students are required to use <u>APA style</u>.
