# Course Description

This course is an introduction to philosophy, which is the oldest of all the academic disciplines. It is the inquiry into all areas of human existence and endeavor, motivated by the desire to know and to learn. We will look back into the history of philosophy and study the different questions philosophers have asked, and the methods they have used to answer those questions. The answers they offer are not necessarily *the* answers, but nonetheless there is much we can learn from them. But even more importantly, we will ask our own questions, about our own world, using the tools of philosophical discourse.
