Course Description

This studio session is designed to introduce the student to the formal qualities of painting through the practice of painting based on perception and observation.

Course Format

The format of this course will involve technical demonstrations to familiarize the student with the technique and formal language involved in working with paint on a two dimensional surface. The focus is the relationship between the formal elements of painting: color, shape, line, texture, space, to the visible world with an emphasis on formal abstraction. Students will also be required to critique their own work as well as their peers in an objective manner.

Course Outcome

At the completion of this course students will not only have an understanding of the basic knowledge required to make a finished painting. But will also be able to convey that knowledge in a verbal manner. The successful student will demonstrate skills of perception that relate to the act of objective seeing

Course Evaluation

Evaluation is primarily based on effort and involvement in the studio activities

Class attendance 6 classes @ 5 points = 30 total Participation = 70 Projects 5 @ 20 points each = 100 200 points total

The successful students projects will demonstrate skills of perception that relate to the act of objective seeing.
