Course Overview/Objectives

Financial interests date back to the settlement of the Western Hemisphere by Europeans. These interests govern our lives today just as they were called into question when The U.S. Constitution was framed as Southern planters fought to keep the "monied interests" of the Federalists out of government.

However, investing is not inherently good or bad. It is a field fraught with risk and return. More importantly, investing is not an end in and of itself. Investments are useful tools that allow us to buy homes, save for retirement, fund our children's education and so forth. Professionally, investments and related industries provide high paying jobs to smart, well-educated and hard-working individuals.

Given the rich financial fabric of our country and, more and more, the inter-connected global business climate, it is important for us to stay current. Indeed, our personal and professional lives grow more complex by the day with the advent of new and exotic investment instruments.

This course considers the fundamentals of four types of investing: equities, fixed income (such as CDs, bonds and preferred stocks), packaged products (such as mutual funds and unit investment trusts) and non-market investments such as a real estate and collectibles.

- recognize the risks and rewards of competing and complimentary investments
- · comprehend and apply quantitative and qualitative decision methods used by investors
- recognize the importance of investments and investment forecasting

Make-up exams will not be offered unless you provide a valid reason <u>ahead of time</u> as to why you will be unable to sit for the regularly scheduled examination. It is your responsibility to notify me <u>prior to</u> each exam to be missed. Otherwise, a grade of zero will be given for each missed exam. In addition to notifying me during class time, it is to your advantage to provide written notification (e.g. e-mail) as it provides a documented account of your notification.

All homework assignments are due at the next regularly scheduled class meeting. You will not receive credit for a late submission unless the following conditions are met:
