Course Description:

This course will combine basic tap technique, musical structure and traditional tap history with new, innovative styles being created in the tap world today. The student will understand the knowledge of tap education at a basic level along with basic musical structure, the role of improvisation in today's tap world; traditional and vintage tap choruses and an overview of American tap history.

Dress: Comfortable, loose fitting clothing is suggested for freedom within

movement. Flat tap shoes are recommended for best sound & clarity. The screws in your tap shoes MUST be tightly attached to the soles of

your shoes to protect the floor & to allow for best quality of sound.

Assignments: Readings will be passed out and videos will be shown throughout the

semester for your information and growth as a tap dancer. Written feedback *may* be required. Supplemental reading and video viewing are

recommended according to individual needs and interests.

Four typed assignments will be given as per the Dance Department handout. There will be a choreography assignment within this course. Students will have ample class time to learn, rehearse & present the choreographed material. At the end of the semester, a showing of the choreography is REQUIRED for the completion of the course. The showing(s) will be during your class time on Wednesday, April 29, 2009; this is your final exam.

Class Format:

- Tap warm up
- Technical review
- Muscle memory exercises
- Choreography
- Improvisation

Course Objectives:

At the completion of the course, the student should be able:

- To come away with an understanding of tap dance as a musical and educational art form and to form an appreciation of American tap history.
- To preserve the history, knowledge and choreography of tap dance pioneers while learning the proper ways to communicate the language of tap through education and performance.

Attendance:

Classes have clear beginnings and endings. Lateness and leaving early are inexcusable. <u>More than two unexcused absences will adversely affect your grade</u>. <u>After more than four absences or non-physical participation within the class, you must withdraw or fail the class.</u>

Participation:
