General Concepts in Professional Nursing

Junior level course, spring 2009

Theory: 2 credits

28 hours of class instruction

Description

Course This course focuses on current issues and trends in nursing and health care for individuals from diverse cultural populations. The course provides an overview of professional issues in nursing, nursing education, the history of nursing and health care delivery. The course will also introduce legal, ethical and cultural issues that impact nursing practice.

Objectives

Course Upon successful completion of the course, the student will:

- 1. Describe the history of nursing and how it relates to current trends in nursing practice.
- 2. Define a profession and discuss how nursing measures as a profession.
- 3. Describe the emerging roles and functions of the professional nurse.
- 4. Identify the collaborative role of the professional nurse in politics and policy making.
- 5. Describe economic changes and their impact of the nursing profession.

- 6. Explore ethical and cultural issues in nursing.
- 7. Understand the need for continued personal and professional growth in nursing.

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Course Format: The course may include use of a variety of teaching methods:

- Active Learning Strategies such as Gaming, Role-playing...
- Discussions
- Field Trips
- **Guest Speakers**
- Lectures
- **Power Point Presentations**
- Ouizzes
- Scholarly Paper
- Student Presentations and Projects

General Learning is an active process. There is no one great authority. Rather it is the exploration of new Policies ideas or concepts or ways of thinking which stimulates a person or people to reflect their actions and ideas in a different light.

The course employs a learning strategy called,

"Think, Pair, Share" (TPS).

There is an ancient Chinese proverb which says:

Tell me, I will forget. Show me, I may remember. Involve me, and I will understand.

The educational philosophy underlying this course is based on this proverb. Research has found that long lasting learning only takes place when we are actively involved in acquiring knowledge. Education is not a passive sport. Therefore we each student will be expected to take an active role in the course.

CLASSROOM PARTICIPATION & PROFESSIONAL BEHAVIOR: Participation during class is expected. Participation includes attendance and engaging in classroom discussion. Professional behavior is outlined in the student handbook. This includes behaviors such as:

- 1. Submission of assignments on the date assigned. Ten points will be deducted from the grade for each day late.
- 2. Reporting to class on time. You must inform the professor of illness or emergencies prior to class. You are responsible for making up any missed material while absent.

- 3. Quizzes will be given throughout the semester as indicated under the grading of the course. These may be announced or unannounced quizzes. If you are unable to attend class, you must notify the professor prior to the start of class. If a quiz was given that day, you will be allowed to take it during that week. You must contact the professor to make arrangements. Quizzes cannot be made up if you fail to notify the professor prior to class that you will be absent. Emergencies will be considered on an individual basis.
- 4. Students are required to keep a hard copy and electronic copy of any written assignments required for the course.
- 5. It is your responsibility to seek help from faculty regarding any problem(s) or questions about assignments or course work. The student should review the <u>Nursing Student Handbook</u> for information regarding the chain of command or for unresolved problems.
- 6. Students are responsible to communicate effectively with faculty via verbal and written techniques such as email, and that email should be checked daily.
- 7. Students are expected to follow the Honor Code of Cedar Crest College.

<u>Honor Code</u>: Plagiarism or any other form of academic dishonesty may result in a failing grade for the assignment or the entire course, at the discretion of the faculty member. Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's idea or language as one's own. Examples of plagiarism include turning in someone else's paper under one's own name with or without additions or modifications, downloading and turning in a paper from the Internet, or including concepts, phrases, sentences, or paragraphs from print or electronic sources--whether verbatim or paraphrased--in one's own paper without proper attribution. Please refer to the student handbook for further clarification.

Students who have previously completed SPS 170/171 may enroll in SPS 170/171 as an "audit" but must participate in all assignments as directed by the course instructor. Students who do not complete the required assignments in SPS 170/171 cannot receive a passing grade in NUR 323.
